PRAISE BE TO YOU



Pope Francis has issued his first encyclical letter Laudato Si' (Praise be to you) on care for our common home. An encyclical letter from a Pope is an important teaching letter. His letter is addressed not only members of the Church but to all people of goodwill (#64). It is a long letter, having 246 specific paragraphs and runs to 191 pages in booklet form.

"It especially calls on those of us living in wealthy countries to address a culture of consumerism. I would encourage everybody to take the time to prayerfully read and reflect on this encyclical. It is a document that has a message for the family community as well as the national and international community."

Some of the themes addressed in the encyclical include:

- The intimate relationship between the poor and the fragility of the planet
- The limits of technology
- The conviction that everything in the world is connected
- The call to seek other ways of understanding the economy and progress

- The value proper to each creature
- The human meaning of ecology
- The need for forthright and honest debate
- The serious responsibility of international and local policy

will this encyclical impact upon the church in the Diocese of Toowoomba. My response was that this important document will need to be studied by small groups from parishes and deaneries around the diocese to come up with practical ideas that we can begin to implement.

At the July meeting of our Diocesan Pastoral Council we resolved to encourage people from parishes to attend the next diocesan in-service on 22-23 September which will have the encyclical on the care of our common home as a focus. We will also look at our own carbon footprint and endeavour to use less and recycle more. Resources will be made available to parishes and schools so that together we can move forward.

We walk this land with many people. We have to take into consideration how our behaviour impacts upon others and how do we plan to pass on our common home to those who come after us.

BUILDING A MORE

ONEST ECONOMY

Acting as Chair of a Board of a local company might not seem to fit the profile of a Church based Social Justice advocate, but it is where I find myself at the moment. I am on the Board of Ability Enterprises. Ability is a Toowoomba company which is also a social enterprise. A social enterprise is a business set up to deliver a service or produce a product with a social dividend. An estimated four to six percent of Australians experience chronic or persistent poverty and half a million children live in families where parents have no job. Those with barriers to work include people with a mental health diagnosis, Aborigines and Torres Strait Islanders, older citizens and those from a refugee background.

Ability Enterprises has over 40 employees, 75 percent of whom have some barrier to employment. As a not for profit company, the dividend we seek is new positions for people who would otherwise be unemployed or on a disability support pension. So when Toowoomba Regional Council uses your rates to provide a friendly face on one of the gatehouses at all of the waste facilities they are doing more than providing a service.

They are deliberately acting to create jobs for people who may otherwise have no way into employment. When government and businesses choose to use social enterprises they are actually addressing entrenched social disadvantage.

Each one of these jobs represents a life changed, not just a statistic. One of our Ability employees started out sleeping in his car parked outside the gatehouse at one of the regions tips. He now has his own secure rental property, he supports others in need and has confidence that enables him to now do tasks that he once would never have considered. There are stories of Ability Employees taking a holiday for the first time in their lives, purchasing a car, creating and sustaining family relationships and moving off the disability support pension. All incredible milestones. The beauty of social enterprises is that they benefit everybody, the employee wins, business wins and government wins.

Social enterprises represent part of what Pope Francis recently called, "a new form of co-operation". In a speech to the Italian Confederation

of Co-operatives in February of this vear the Pope criticised "a certain liberalism", which "believes it is first necessary to produce wealth—and it does not matter how—to then promote some state redistribution policy". He exhorted the co-operative movement to join the global economy to promote both "an economy of honesty" and "a healing economy". He urged them to exercise "the courage and the imagination to build a just path, so as to integrate development, justice and peace in the world". Social enterprises such as Ability have the capacity to promote this "economy of honesty". Profit is not the goal of a social enterprise, instead at their very heart is the dignity and full participation of the human person.

Nancy is the daughter of William and Florence Doyle (decd) and grew up in Wallaroobi near Ariah Park where she attended the local school before going to Wagga Wagga to Mount Erin College. On leaving school Nancy worked as a governess at Peak Hill and in retail and Medical Benefits in Sydney prior to joining the Missionary Sisters of Service.

Mary grew up in Warwick, the eldest daughter of Jack and Dorrie Cleary (decd). She attended St Mary's Primary School and had two years at All Hallows School, Brisbane. Mary worked as a public servant in the Forestry

Department in Brisbane before being transferred back home to Warwick for 6 years. It was in those years that Mary was very involved in NCGM/YCW to which she attributes her vocation.

Over these 50 years, Nancy has ministered in the Hobart Archdiocese, at Whyalla in Port Pirie Diocese and as Pastoral Leader in Giru, Townsville Diocese. Nancy was the first religious Pastoral Leader of a parish without a resident priest at Oatlands, in the Hobart Archdiocese. Nancy worked in the Caloundra Parish, residing at Landsborough and ministering to

the rural communities for 13 years.

Mary has travelled widely in her ministry in the Wilcannia/Forbes,
Port Pirie, and Toowoomba Dioceses as well as the Hobart and Melbourne Archdioceses. She was a Pastoral Leader for 8 years in Beaconsfield, Tasmania on the retirement of the parish priest and at Jandowae, Queensland for over 12 years.

Nancy and Mary now live in Toowoomba and are involved in voluntary work and other activities in the city.

After Mass there was open day out at the Taylor's home, Wingarie Park,



ECUMENICAL HOSPITAL MINISTRY

AND PASTORAL CARE COURSE

For the past twenty-three years in this Diocese, the 'Ecumenical Hospital Ministry and Pastoral Care Course' has provided training in pastoral care for healthcare settings. This course enabled participants to gain an understanding of and experience in pastoral ministry in a healthcare environment and to assist in the development of appropriate personal and pastoral skills for ministry with sick and aged people. Over 200 lay people have been trained during this time and have offered their valued services in healthcare facilities in Toowoomba and the wider region.

The course placed a heavy emphasis on theological reflection and spiritual development. It too had a wider application to pastoral ministry in other settings such as in parishes and nursing homes and mental health facilities.

The beauty of this particular course was the ecumenical nature. We accept ecumenism to embrace not only people from Christian traditions, but also from other faith traditions. It has been our experience that the participants from various traditions worked together so well, that within a few weeks awareness of differences was not an issue.

An overriding emphasis throughout the course has been the personal development of the participants. It was recognised that where a participant has an unresolved personal issue such as grief, or a spirituality which required further development, that it may interfere with their ability to listen to the feelings and spiritual struggle of the patient being visited.

Co-ordination, supervision and mentoring have been the key to the integration of the theory into practice and the smooth running of same.

renewed in 2016, I wish to inform you that we have decided to find new ways to equip people in the area of pastoral care ministry-training.

The exciting news is that we are going to continue Hospital Ministry and Pastoral Care training in 2016. This will be with a new educational

The course would not have been as successful as it has been if we did not have the dedicated pastoral care team members who have offered voluntarily their trained supervisory and mentoring giftedness over these many years. For this we are ever grateful.

The 'Hospital Ministry and Pastoral Care Course' has been reviewed, renewed, evaluated and updated over the years and now it is time to move on. With new forms of training expected in Hospital Ministry and with the course licence not being

provider, Queensland Institute of Clinical Pastoral Education, a worldwide recognized form of training. At present we are negotiating and firming up working relationships. The Course will commence late January and recruiting will begin around October this year. CPE will be advertised throughout Parish bulletins.

As sad as we are that the present course has run its race, the good news is that Hospital Ministry Training will continue in the form of Clinical Pastoral Education in 2016.

FR JEFF SCULLY REMEMBERED

AS A MAN WHO TOUCHED PEOPLE'S LIVES

Fr Jeff Scully, was remembered at his funeral Mass on Monday 29 June as a pastor, a friend and person of the people, qualities that made him a beloved figure in the Catholic and wider community. It was standing room only with nearly 1000 people assembled to pay their respects to Fr Scully. Bishop Robert McGuckin presided at the liturgy which was concelebrated by Bishop Emeritus Bill Morris, clergy from near and far including his seminary classmates.

Fr Frank O'Loughlin, Parish Priest of Sacred Heart Sandringham in Victoria, shared his reflections on the friendship he had developed with Fr Scully over 50 years. Fr O'Loughlin and Fr Scully studied together at the University of Propaganda Fide in Rome before their ordinations to the priesthood in 1969. The Words of Remembrance from Fr O'Loughlin painted the picture of Fr Scully as

a great friend whose humility and openness endeared him to all he met.

During the Homily Bishop Morris spoke of Fr Scully's sharp intellect, infectious humour and willingness to speak the truth when it needed to be spoken. Bishop Morris' long association with Fr Scully began when they were classmates at the Banyo Seminary and continued from that time.

After Fr Scully's ordination to the priesthood in St Patrick's Cathedral Toowoomba by Bishop William Brennan his priestly appointments included the Cathedral, St Mary's Goondiwindi, St Joseph's Dalby, St Clare of Montefalco Tully and St Thomas More's Toowoomba. Fr Scully last appointment was at St Finbarr's Quilpie where he ministered from 1980 to 2007. The people of Quilpie played a special part in Fr Scully's journey through life and those 27 years were full of many memorable experiences.

Fr Scully, died on the morning of Wednesday 24 June after he collapsed at home. He was 73. His unexpected death left many who had been touch by Fr Scully's ministry wanting to pay tribute to his life and service to the community. Fr Jeff Scully will be remembered for his generous spirit, faithfulness and compassion.

REMEMBERING FR JOHN CLANCY

In what has proved to be a very sad time for the Diocese, Fr John (Jack) Clancy was farewelled at his funeral Mass on Wednesday 8 July, he was remembered by many as a hospitable, open, community minded and intelligent man. Fr Clancy was born 31 December, 1931 in Toowoomba to John Clancy and Margaret Logan. He was schooled in Toowoomba at St Saviour's Primary School and St Mary's College. Fr Clancy attended Pius XII Seminary, Banyo and was ordained 29 June, 1956 by Bishop William Brennan DD at St Patrick's Cathedral Toowoomba.

Fr Clancy was in active ministry from 1956 to 2006, serving in Warwick, Charleville, St Patrick's Cathedral, Our Lady of Lourdes, Dalby, Taroom, Oakey and Cunnamulla as well as some time outside of the Diocese at Mt Newman/

Port Headland. In 2006 Fr Clancy retired and was Priest in residence at Pittsworth. In 2011 Fr Clancy moved to Vianney Village at Lourdes Home. He died peacefully 8 July, 2015.

In his words of remembrance, Emeritus Bishop Bill Morris described Fr Clancy as "a silent Pastor who came and went almost unnoticed ... With his generous heart he would silently and thoughtfully try to address [people's] needs without fuss and with great respect." He said, in the words of Pope Francis, that Fr Clancy had "a missionary heart always [doing] what good he could even if in the process [his] shoes got soiled by the mud of the street".

As part of his Homily, Fr Mick Carroll described Fr Clancy as "a master of relationships". "I have experienced

his warm hospitality over the years, as I am sure many of the priests here and elsewhere have. Clance was very conscious of the sacramental bond that unites us." Fr Carroll recalled.

Despite being out of active ministry for a few years due to declining health, it was obvious that Fr Clancy held a special place in so many people's hearts.

FOUNDED ON A SPIRITUALITY

OF FRIENDSHIP

It is part of our deepest nature to be in relationship with others, it is integral to the history of our species. We're made for relationships because that is how God made us.

Al Etmanski author of 'A Good Life' puts it this way: "To be isolated is an enormous tragedy for any human being. Yet we cannot force people to love us, to be our friend. We cannot claim it as a right. Government cannot provide it. Money cannot buy it. To be in relationship comes from somewhere else."

Over the past 30 years we have come a long way in understanding and addressing the needs of people with disabilities and there has been much effort in ensuring that the 'basics' of life for people with disabilities are met and planned for. However, attention to the most fundamental of all human needs – our yearning for love and for relationships, has sometimes been sidelined as an 'optional extra'.

When we consider our own personal story, we will discover a story of relationships. We grow, develop and change with others. To live a fruitful and fulfilling life, we require the support and encouragement of family and friends; we require love, respect, belonging, dignity, fellowship, and solidarity to flourish.

If this is true of life in general, then it

is also true for our faith life. For no one believes alone. This has been the cry of SPRED for the past 30 years. We need to belong to a group of people who believe if we are to grow in faith, and the human experience closest to the experience of faith is friendship. SPRED Volunteer catechists welcome those with intellectual disability into their midst as loved and valued friends, encouraging and supporting them, walking beside them as faith companions. SPRED friendships are Christ-centred and as such allow us to connect with him in a way that we will not on our own.

Blessed John Paul II taught that to grow communities of Christians, we ought to foster ... "small basic or so-called 'living' communities, where the faithful can communicate

the Word of God and express it in service and love to one another..." Each week our SPRED Sessions do just this. As members of SPRED we have the opportunity and privilege of making a real and lasting difference in the lives of our SPRED Friends.

I grew up on my family's farm in Stanthorpe, as one of six children to Joe and Nita Gasparin. I attended St Joseph's School at Stanthorpe from pre-school to year 12. In 2008 I moved to Toowoomba to begin a Bachelor of Nursing at the University of Southern Queensland, later moving to Brisbane in 2011 to start my new employment as a registered nurse. World Youth Day in Sydney (2008) and in Brazil (2013) were turning points in my faith journey because I came to more deeply discover my desire to know God and I felt compelled to accept the Pope's invitation to 'encounter' Him. In 2012 I met the Verbum Dei Missionaries in Brisbane. With their guidance, I learnt to pray by dialoguing with the Trinity through the scriptures. It was through this form of prayer that I came to understand God calling me to consecrate my life to Him and His mission.

The Verbum Dei Missionary

Fraternity was founded in 1963 by Fr Jaime Bonet in the Diocese of Mallorca (Spain). The charism of the community is prayer and ministry of the Word with the specific mission of forming apostles and evangelising communities for Christ. As a postulant, I am now dedicating my time to this mission and experiencing what it means to give my life fully to God. I participate in weekly 'School of the Word' prayer meetings, regular formations, retreats and evangelisation opportunities. I have been finding this whole process and experience life-giving and challenging, however it is also a deep source of joy as my relationship with the Trinity becomes more concrete and intimate. It is my prayer in this 'Year of Consecrated Life' that all may be open to listening to God's personal call to each of us to consecrate our lives to him - whether or not it be in the religious life. For as creatures of God, we will not be satisfied until we are united with him. In the words of St Augustine, 'you have made us for yourself, and our



hearts are restless, until they can find rest in you.' I will be leaving Australia in the coming months to begin my novitiate. Please keep me in your prayers as I continue to pray for you and give thanks to God for the blessing each of you have been to me.

On Saturday 13 June 2015, approximately seventy-five members of pastoral councils (both diocesan and parish) came together at the James Byrne Centre for a formation day with the theme "Put out into the Deep". This was facilitated by Fr Philip Marshall, Vicar General of the Archdiocese of Adelaide, whose ability to listen to real life experiences and connect them in a simple and clear manner to the challenge of the Gospel was found by the gathering to be both refreshing and enriching. Fr Philip touched on a number of key concepts such as the importance of joy and why prayer is an indispensable element in nurturing communion, dialogue as a key pastoral method, and our call to be builders of 'Shalom'. Parish pastoral councils were left with challenging questions to answer

for themselves so that these ideas could find concrete expression and bear fruit. To all of us who might sometimes feel overwhelmed by the challenge of the Gospel, Fr Philip's four-sentence summary reminds us of the essence of our call.

Everybody matters, absolutely Every broken heart and relationship are to be mended God's plan for every person is joy and life to the full So that creation might be a glorious joyful and eternal song of praise and love to God.

The day ended with the celebration of Eucharist during which Bishop Robert McGuckin commissioned parish councils to accept the light of Christ to guide their leadership of service to the parishes and diocese of Toowoomba.

WORKSHOPS CONTINUE

TO RECAST NETS

Following the endorsement of Bishop Robert, members of the Diocesan Mission and Ministry Team have begun a series of Regional Workshops. These Workshops aim to share more widely throughout the diocese the key messages from the Proclaim 2014 Conference and the Diocesan Inservice "Recasting our Nets: Renewing Parishes, Making Disciples" held in March, 2015. As a starting point for engaging with the people of the diocese, three topics summarised from a total of five days of workshop material formed the focus of this two hour workshop. The presenters each focused on the particular topic that related more directly to their specific area of ministry.

As Diocesan Spirituality and Mission Development Officer, Sr Elaine Morzone looked at the theme "Called to be Joyful Missionary Disciples" which highlighted that "Recasting Our Nets" is not primarily a matter of restructuring or coming up with strategies that attract people, but more fundamentally an invitation to embark on a personal and communal spiritual journey where mission and spirituality are two sides of the same coin. In the words of John O'Donohue, "When we are in touch with our inner landscape, what we do carries the fire of passion and creativity."

Sarah de Byl, Diocesan Youth Coordinator, presented a profile of the voices we are not hearing and reminded us that "our parish is our postcode" and is not limited to those who attend

our church services. She highlighted statistics which indicate that many who consider themselves Catholics do not have a sense of belonging to the local parish community. Her challenge was that we "invest and invite", that we put our energies into what is core to who we are and personally invite and welcome those who have been alienated or who are searching to share our experience.

John Briffa, Diocesan Liturgy
Officer, focused on how the identity
of each local parish could be
deepened and strengthened by
evaluating how we do the things
which make us who we are in terms
of our Catholic tradition. Highlighting
the gospel text "I was a stranger
and you welcomed me" (Mt. 25:35),
he drew the attention of the group
to those events in the life of a parish
where we come into contact with new
people. The group was encouraged
to explore how we might use these
occasions to welcome newcomers

as a starting point to building new relationships and making disciples.

During the regional workshops, the team has valued the opportunity of meeting with committed parishioners from Texas, Goondiwindi, Inglewood, St George, Roma, Mitchell, Wallumbilla, Miles, Chinchilla, Taroom, Dalby, Toowoomba and Jandowae (to date). The sessions have provided a wonderful opportunity to hear voices that are not normally heard. Recognising that there is not one solution to fit all, the intention of the workshops is to encourage further conversation at the parish level which leads to parish action. The hope of the Mission and Ministry Team is to further deepen the dialogue which has just begun.

LOVE & RESPECT — EXPLORING THE WORK OF GRATIAN

Talk given by Fr Brian Sparksman to a meeting of the Queensland Community Alliance and the Goodwill Committee of Toowoomba.



The Decretum Gratiani, is a collection of Church law compiled by Gratian, a12th century monk in Bologna. In big volumes, he reproduced, and commented on, the work of hundreds of spiritual writers.

In 1977 Bishop Kelly asked me to study Church Law. He warned me there would be a class on Gratian where you had to do a presentation on a subject not already treated, giving me a list of legal subject matters. But they had already been done! Poking around Gratian I had noted references to my favourite subject - singing. I also found the subject of singing in church had never been researched before! I can still see the look of horror on Professor Jack Lynch's face when I announced my subject. BUT afterwards Jack shook my hand saying that in 40 years working on Gratian he had never been aware of what I had found. And that it was a great subject for my Licentiate Thesis! With Jack's encouragement [insistence] it developed into my 382 page Doctoral dissertation!

Gratian's work, The Decretum Gratiani, was used by canonists till May 1918, when a revised Code of Canon Law was promulgated by Pope Benedict XV. But it is not just a legal work. In many ways it is a spiritual encyclopaedia. I refer only to two concepts: **Love & Respect.**

Gratian comments on the entity of 'perfected love', which 'once it is achieved - is never lost.' He also adds "No one immediately becomes the best, but, by leading a good life, which does not exist without love, everyone begins at the bottom so that they may reach the top." Further he writes: "Therefore there are degrees not only from one virtue (Gift or Good quality) but also to degrees of living out that gift or quality."

Gratian is addressing a quote from Augustine (354-430) - a theologian/philosopher. In a chapter "De libero arbitrio" [Concerning Freedom of Choice] Augustine says 'Love has securely been born in you, but has not been perfected; do not despair, nurture it rather than suffocate it!

Gratian's treats selections of debates about (a) the subject of virtue [gift] in Christians responding to God's grace, (b) the subject of the very same virtue [or gift] evident in non-Christians, and (c) then how either of these, or these two working together, lead us to the need of love and respect for each other.

Gratian admits that we can all fail, saying: 'We have briefly written about love on account of those who deny that we can be repentant after failure – again and again.' He cautions about NOT continuing to FAIL, stressing the benefits of steadiness in faith and love.

Gratian also quotes Bishop Isidore of Seville 560-636. Isidore stresses the spiritual needs of the people, that it is most important to educate the people – opening out to them the truths of faith. It is imperative that love is accompanied by respect for the people and care for their spiritual needs.

The understanding of LOVE from Augustine, and Isidore's stress on respect for the people, give an age-old basis for membership of the Goodwill Committee. We, members of that Committee, are called to love and respect for each other - and for the community in general. We work towards the benefit of our people, especially in expanding their knowledge. We need to live our lives with decorum. for our OWN sake and the sake of others. Our individual role is to bring the best qualities of our particular gifts to enhance this role especially for the benefit of our community. ##



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HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF

Recently Charleville was visited by the Q150 Steam Train. This brought to mind memories of times long gone from "A Great Traveller on Tour". The Rev Fr Cashman left Charleville by train for Cunnamulla, thence to Thargomindah by coach, visiting Eulo and all the stations en route. On his return journey the reverent gentleman will spend a few days in Cunnamulla, Wyandra, and Murweh, reaching Charleville for the 17th instant. (Extract from The Catholic Advocate, 9th December, 1911.) Our present Parish Priest, Fr Peter Doohan, is rather pleased that he can travel the same distances today in the comfort of his four wheel drive and in much less time.

ASYLUM SEEKERS' PLIGHT



St Joseph's College, Toowoomba in conjunction with the Toowoomba Diocese Social Justice Commission invited Catholic secondary schools across Toowoomba to challenge themselves and sacrifice 45 minutes of their time on a chilly winter's night.

Over 150 students, staff and community members answered this call and journeyed with the Just Joeys social justice group from St Joseph's College to walk in solidarity with asylum seekers and refugees from across the world.

Candles, lanterns and torches glowed in the early evening the group travelled in procession along Lindsay St and Margaret St, in a moving lantern parade.

"Following the success of last year's event Just Joeys decided to continue to hold another lantern parade as a part of Catholic Education Week," said Julieanne Rasmussen, Assistant Principal Faith and Mission from St Joseph's College.

"Catholic Education Week this year is about Engaging Minds. Igniting Hearts. Serving Others. and at Catholic Schools we teach and learn about the principles of social justice. So having this parade

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CONCANNON COLLEGE 30 YEARS YOUNG

In 1985 there was an acute accommodation problem at the Darling Downs Institute of Advanced Education (DDIAE), now known as the University of Southern Queensland. Bishop Edward Kelly MSC recognized this need and put forth a proposal to establish a residential college on Diocesan land adjoining the DDIAE.

The proposed college was to provide accommodation for Catholic students, both male and female, from country areas of the Diocese. The living standards would be comfortable and there would be a good study environment as well as spiritual guidance for all students.

The foundation stone of Concannon College was blessed and laid by Monsignor Edward Concannon, P.P., V.G., on the 11th May 1985. The College began with A and B Blocks accommodating 50 residents and was officially Blessed and opened by Cardinal Sir James Freeman D.D., on the 28th July, 1985, which was the International Year for Youth.

Concannon College was jointly named to honour the four Concannon brothers, who served as priests in the Toowoomba and Brisbane Dioceses, and to especially recognise Monsignor Edward Concannon for his work and devotion to youth and education throughout the Diocese.

2015 marks 30 years since Concannon College was opened. Students past and present, the Concannon College Council and University staff joined with Bishop Robert McGuckin at the annual Bishop's Dinner to celebrate the college's great history and service to USQ students.

Past alumni and guests were given a tour of the facilities and shared what it was like to live at the college when it was first built. Tom Swanton, an 1985 alumni, shared his personal collection of memorabilia from his time at Concannon.

Bishop Robert spoke about the history of Concannon, the ways the Diocese's involvement in the college

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
