Lenten Message 2016



Ash Wednesday ushered in the season of Lent, a special time when we are called to grow in our response to the Lord's call to love one another. It is a time of prayer, of fasting and of alms giving.

His Holiness Pope Francis has declared this year a special extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy. He has asked that the season of Lent in this jubilee year be lived more intensely as a privileged moment to celebrate and experience God's mercy. He calls us to have an attentive listening to God's word and encouraged the initiative "24 Hours for the Lord" on 4-5 March.

In addition to the special 24 Hours for the Lord, I ask parishes, where possible, to each week have an hour of adoration before the Blessed Sacrament, a special time of prayer. May we pray for our needs and the needs of our world. Please also pray for vocations to the priesthood and to the religious life.

As Pope Francis says, "God shows himself ever rich in mercy, ever ready to treat his people with deep tenderness and compassion. God's mercy transforms human hearts, it enables ours, through the experience of faithful love, to become merciful in return".

In Lent then by stepping aside for time in prayer we will grow in the love of God in our friendship with Jesus and be more finely attuned to the

I am indeed heartened by the young people in our schools who are ambassadors for Project Compassion.

I commend the Lenten programs that are being offered in our parishes. By participating in such programs there is the realisation that Lent is not a journey we undertake alone.

The call on Ash Wednesday was that we turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel. If Pope Francis can call himself a sinner then we too should see our need for forgiveness and be ready to receive the mercy that God continually offers us. The Diocesan Liturgy Office has sent to Parishes the ritual for the Sacrament of Penance during Lent. Parishes will offer this Sacrament during Lent and we should all take that opportunity to be reconciled to God and to one another.

Pope Francis has expressed his hope that "the Christian people may reflect on the corporal and spiritual works of mercy; that this will be a way to reawaken our conscience, too often grown dull in the face of poverty, and to enter more deeply into the heart of the Gospel where the poor have a special experience of God's mercy".

May Lent be for all of us a favourable time by listening to God's word and by practising the works of mercy.

James Byrne Centre Expansion

The James Byrne Centre has been an invaluable resource to the Toowoomba Diocese. The Retreat and Education Centre is approximately 20 minutes north of Toowoomba, just outside of Highfields. Set on 130 acres with spectacular range views of the Lockyer Valley and surrounded by bushland, the Centre is the legacy of Bishop Edward Kelly and generous local families and individuals through their bequests of land and money. The centre is named after Toowoomba's first Bishop, James Byrne. Opened in 1980, the Centre consisted of Sanctuary House, the Chapel, the Old Hall and another transportable building. The Marian Hall was added in 1981, the main accommodation block in 1982 and the dining hall was the last building added in 1986.

After much planning, Kelly House is the first new building on the James Byrne Centre site in 30 years. It is only fitting that it is named after Toowoomba's fourth Bishop and James Byrne Centre instigator, Edward Kelly. Rob Fiedler was the architect for the project, his wife Majella provided interior décor design and Taddio Building Group oversaw the construction. The new building sits on the spot once occupied by the Old Hall, which was sold and removed. The brand new accommodation block was conceived to meet the growing demand for the centre in general as well as expanding on the total capacity to accommodate large

school groups. Kelly House adds an additional 30 beds accommodation, has a well equipped conference area to comfortably fit 50 occupants as well as a kitchen.

Kelly House was officially opened and blessed by Bishop Robert McGuckin on Thursday 7th January. Bishop Robert was joined by Centre Managers, Paul and Wendy Ladewig and Diocesan Priests for the special occasion. The blessing wrapped up the annual Diocesan Priests' Retreat which was being held at the James Byrne Centre. Paul and Wendy documented the project from the Old Hall removal through to the Kelly House completion. They have put together the photos in a video presentation which can be viewed at www.jamesbyrnecentre.org.au.

The bills piled up and we missed a couple of rent payments. My partner started drinking and sometimes I think he might get violent with me or the kids. I don't know where to go to get help and I'm afraid that Child Safety might get involved.

Does this sound like your story? Or maybe it's the story of someone you know.

Family and Child Connect is a

new family support service which helps families with the challenges they face by connecting them to appropriate services before these challenges become acute problems.

Mercy Community Services South West Queensland, in partnership with Lifeline Darling Downs and South West Queensland, is delivering Family and Child Connect to communities in Toowoomba and Roma.

Family and Child Connect helps families develop parenting skills and manage child behaviour, build better relationships between family members and deal with violence in the home. The service also supports families in budgeting and money management, with alcohol, drug or gambling problems and with access to housing, health care or other community or government services.

Frances Klaassen OAM, Senior Manager of Mercy Community Services SWQ, described how Family and Child Connect works through connecting closely with communities: 'Our strong links with communities means that we can offer families different options that will help them care for and protect their children at home'.

Keeping the Vulnerable Safe

Participants from Roma, Cunnamulla, Charleville, and St George gathered at All Saints' Parish Hall, Roma on Monday 1st February for a workshop relating to the diocesan policy on Safeguarding Children and the Vulnerable. George Keryk and Majella Albion from the Diocesan Professional Standards and Safeguards Committee outlined details of the Diocesan response to issues

raised in the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Sexual Child Abuse. The Diocese of Toowoomba respects and upholds the dignity of children and the vulnerable, and an integral part of the policy is to acknowledge and ensure that everyone has a right to feel safe in all Church environments. One strategy to achieve this is the establishment of a network of Safeguarding Representatives, and the Roma meeting was the second of a series of workshops conducted throughout the diocese to describe this role, and to recruit and train possible volunteers.

Other speakers included Michelle Leadbetter, Principal Child Protection Practitioner from the Department of Communities, Child Safety and Disability Services; Yolunda Lambourne, Lifeline Family Response Facilitator South West Region; and Helen Druce, a counsellor from Chinchilla who conducted a session on listening skills.

There was useful and productive discussion raised around various

case study scenarios presented to the group, highlighting some of the unique difficulties faced by people trying to provide services to families in crisis in remote regions.

HORIZONS: CONNECTING THE DIOCESE FOR 10 YEARS

In 2005, then Bishop of Toowoomba, Bill Morris, approached Sr Eileen March with the suggestion of starting a diocesan magazine. Sr Eileen had experience with her congregation's mission publication Echo from Africa and other continents and had also worked in one of her congregation's printing presses. With so many services, like banks, shops, even medical facilities, disappearing out west, the people were feeling abandoned and isolated. Bishop Bill wanted them to know that they were valued as members of our diocesan family and they were not alone, that the whole diocese shared their concerns, their joys and sorrows. So in January 2006, Issue 1 of Horizons of Toowoomba Diocese was published.

A previous incarnation of printed communication in the Diocese was a newspaper, Catholic Future. This was conceived primarily a reporting tool of the Diocesan Development Fund, but the magazine Bishop Morris envisioned was to have a much wider scope: a reporting tool for the whole diocese in which every event could be shared, whether it was a personal milestone such as a special birthday or anniversary; a parish celebration such as First

Communions, Confirmations, Lenten/Easter/Christmas liturgies etc., or a large diocesan event such as the Diocesan Gatherings.

The name Horizons of Toowoomba Diocese was chosen because it encompasses the vastness of the diocese while avoiding the difficulty of trying to name its geographical area. To travel in our vast diocese, is to travel towards a horizon – which in turn suggests looking beyond the present towards the future and reaching goals.

Originally the publication was sent to parishes and agencies within the Toowoomba Diocese. Horizons was very well received and grew in popularity, so much so that the page count has increased over the years as well as the printed quantity. The schools in the diocese quickly became regular contributors and at the request of then Director of Catholic Education, John Borserio, copies were circulated within the schools.

We asked Sr Eileen about her time as editor of Horizons and what she enjoyed the most, "Apart from enjoying the actual 'work' of putting together the magazine, I enjoyed working with the members of the Media Committee. Also, several ladies generously took on the role of honorary 'Media

Liaison Officer' for their parishes and worked hard to write up and send news articles from their parish for publication. I enjoyed, most of all, getting to know the diocese better – and some of its wonderful people."

So, does Sr Eileen have a favourite edition? "One favourite? There are too many to mention! The 2007 'Journey of the World Youth Day and Icon' was truly awesome. . . There was the Farewell Mass for Bishop Morris in 2011, and the Episcopal Ordination of Bishop McGuckin in 2012. These were both milestones for the diocese, as were the Diocesan Gatherings, so they stand out in my memory."

"I feel very privileged to be a part of this diocesan family and to have had the opportunity, as editor of Horizons, to gain a deeper insight into the lives of its wonderful members."

Today the original vision for Horizons carries on. Under the patronage of Bishop Robert McGuckin Horizons continues to be supported and recognised as playing a vital communications function. It is still a conduit for news and information within the Toowoomba Diocese, drawing all parishes, schools and ministries together as a diocesan family.





CELEBRATING THE YEAR OF MERCY CELEBRATING LITURGY IN YOUR PARISH

In announcing the Year of Mercy, Pope Francis invited us to contemplate just how merciful God has been to us and, in turn, to understand better how we are called to be merciful to others:

How much I desire that the year to come will be steeped in mercy, so that we can go out to every man and woman, bringing the goodness and tenderness of God! May the balm of mercy reach everyone, both believers and those far away, as a sign that the Kingdom of God is already present in our midst! Misericordiae Vultus (5)

During this Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy, and most particularly during Lent, parishes can place a special focus on their reconciliation liturgies as a way of celebrating God's mercy not only for those within the church, but to also try to reconnect with the wider community.

Time to rethink reconciliation

Discern a team who are not afraid to try something new. Invite faith-filled people who reflect the diversity of your parish (age, gender, ethnicity & spirituality) to meet with the liturgy team. Spend time in prayer and study the sacrament of reconciliation. Reflect on the spiritual and corporal works of mercy. Think of realistic ways to increase the number of parishioners who celebrate the sacrament of God's mercy by making it easier and more meaningful for them to do so.

Begin with the Sunday liturgy

Examine the Sunday readings, especially the Gospels, and create one or two locally sensitive reflection questions to put in the parish (&

school) bulletin each week. Identify particular images in hymns that speak of mercy, and integrate those images into the seasonal church environment. For example, if a hymn speaks of washing away sin, create or find an image of rain on lush greenery. If a song speaks of a rich harvest, create an image or a montage of the produce of your area. Keep in mind how a smile and kind word creates an atmosphere in which all feel comfortable. Young families and adults of all ages can be greeters. If parishioners speak differing languages, spend time training greeters to say hello in those languages.

Consider existing activities

Review existing parish activities and identify ones into which the theme of forgiveness can be integrated. For example, a parents' group might invite a speaker to give tips for teaching children to forgive. Homebound parishioners might be invited to pray by name for families going through difficulties or to write notes of encouragement. Those in the Visitation ministry might take paper, pens and stamps and encourage and assist those they visit to write to a family member to whom they have not spoken in a long while.

Make reconciliation more accessible and meaningful

Many parishes offer weekly confession, only adding special reconciliation services during Advent and Lent. Consider offering alternate confession times, for example, Saturday morning on first weekend of



month, Wednesday evening in third week, and Friday night in the last week. Promote more frequent use of the second rite of penance, include a ritual action and invite all elements of your community to participate. Give different people a role. Visitors will feel more comfortable when they see people like themselves being involved. Consider using the corporal and spiritual works of mercy as penance, making a connection with deeds that bring reconciliation to the world. In your bulletin or visual aids, list concrete ways the various works of mercy can be lived in your community.

Don't be afraid to promote what you are doing. Nobody will come if they don't know what is happening. People only recognize God's mercy once they have experience it, but every new experience calls us to share that mercy with others.



YEAR OF MERCY DIOCESAN LAUNCH

On Sunday 13 December Bishop Robert McGuckin opened the Door of Mercy at St Patricks Cathedral in solidarity with Bishops across Australia and around the world. The opening of the Door of Mercy, just days after Pope Francis officially opened the Holy Year of Mercy at the Vatican, signifies the beginning of the Holy Year which will conclude on Sunday 20 November 2016. The ceremony was incorporated into the 9.00am Celebration of the Eucharist and parishioners processed through the

Throughout the Holy Year of Mercy there will be a range of local opportunities for people to more fully engage with the celebration of this important initiative. As new programs or events are identified they will be promoted through the Diocesan Year of Mercy Committee and local parish contacts.

Sr Elaine Morzone and Fr Hal Ranger are offering parishes a "Mini-Mission of Mercy" which will be custom designed to suit local needs at a mutually convenient time between Easter and the conclusion of the year of Mercy. Sr Elaine, the Spirituality and Mission Development Officer for the Diocese, said that the Mini-Missions were "a forum for parishioners to share

With so many opportunities being made available throughout the Diocese there will be a chance for all to take up Pope Francis' challenge, "Let us set aside all fear and dread, for these do not befit men and women who are loved. Instead, let us experience the joy of encountering that grace which transforms all things."

DIGNITY PROJECT

SUPPORTS DESPERATE FAMILY

Many of us have been in the fortunate situation where we have been able to take advantage of educational opportunities to increase our knowledge, and hopefully add to our employability. Whilst it is not something we take for granted, nevertheless we recognise that we live in a country that enables this process. For Mr and Mrs G, the opportunity to study at the University of Southern Queensland was greeted with much enthusiasm, and so they packed up their three school aged children and moved from Iraq to Toowoomba to study.

During this time, the conditions in Iraq deteriorated greatly, and as one of the Christian minority, they were facing a life threatening situation if they returned and so they applied for Australia's protection as refugees, becoming instant asylum seekers. However this did not immediately give them peace of mind for they had no form of support as Mrs G's scholarship from the

Iraqi government instantly ceased.

Now they found themselves living in the city of Toowoomba with little access to any financial, medical or educational supports. Into this complexity, the Dignity Project caseworker from Centacare came and with a fortnightly round table we were able to support the family with basic food and clothing needs. The next issue to be tackled was the Queensland State government Education Department - charging the family close to \$700 per week to send their children to the local state school. After a number of unsuccessful meetings, the caseworker was finally able to lodge an appeal, with a myriad of translated documents and letters of support.

As the school year started this year, the family received the very welcome news that the appeal was successful and the \$10 000 debt had been cancelled. Furthermore, the family has now been granted protection and has gained permanent residency.



Whilst this "win" was due to a number of contributors, it simply would not have happened without the actions of the caseworker for the Dignity Project, funded by Mercy Works.

PASTORAL COUNCILS PROMOTING

GOD'S MERCIFUL MISSION

On Saturday 13 February, approximately sixty members of pastoral councils representing twenty parishes of the diocese came together at the James Byrne Centre, Highfields, in a reflective and relaxed atmosphere. They reflected more deeply on their role of leadership in contributing to God's merciful mission, particularly during this special Jubilee Year of Mercy. While it was wonderful to experience the enthusiasm and energy of those gathered, there was a concerned awareness that a number of parishes were not represented. There would be a variety of reasons for this but it seems that they might include time and distance factors as well as the reality of personnel diminishment.

In the aftermath of the 13 June 2015 Development Day, some participants expressed the desire to strengthen the networking process that had begun that day and to search for ways of offering greater support across parish boundaries, particularly to parishes with limited resources. A reference

group was formed to begin the process – Doug Birrell and Lyn Cash (St. Patrick's Cathedral Parish), Marie Cleary (St. Thomas More's Parish), David Rogan (St. Theresa's Parish) and Stephen Connolly (Our Lady of Lourdes Parish.) They joined with me in the process of planning which gave direction to the theme and process for this year's development day, "How Parish Pastoral Councils Contribute to God's Merciful Mission."

Through a process of input, personal reflection, facilitation and group sharing, Sisters Margaret Endicott and Carmel Dwan (both Sisters of Mercy) skillfully led the group to reflect on the purpose of the Year of Mercy allowing themselves to experience the touch and challenge of God's mercy personally, to interpret the invitation and challenge of the traditional corporal and spiritual works of mercy through the lens of "Laudato Si" and our current world situation, and to consider concrete actions that particular parishes might take in response to



the call of Pope Francis for this Year of Mercy. The day concluded with a ritual during which each parish group or representative made a statement of belief and commitment, received a copy of Pope Francis' "Misericordiae Vultus" ("The Face of Mercy") for their ongoing spiritual

enrichment, and passed through the "Door of Mercy" on mission to open the doors of mercy to others in their parishes and beyond.

Participants responded very positively to the experience of the day, grateful for the enriching and well-presented input as well as the opportunity to interact with people from other parishes. It was described as "a wonderful day of fellowship and education." Representing the reference group which would like to encourage networking throughout the diocese and support for parishes with more limited resources, Doug Birrell invited parishes to become part of an ongoing process.



THE END OF AN ERA 1875-2016

At the invitation of the first Parish Priest of Stanthorpe, Fr Jerome Davadi who arrived on the Granite Belt in 1874, three Sisters of Mercy arrived from All Hallows, Brisbane in 1875 to establish a Parish School and offer a Catholic education to the children of Stanthorpe and the Granite Belt. The School grew as the years progressed, the two storey Convent for the Sisters was built in 1932, and many Sisters of Mercy taught at St. Joseph's and lived and ministered in St. Joseph's Parish.

By 1989 the School was totally staffed by lay teachers. Since the withdrawal of the Sisters from the School, there was initially a small community of Sisters living in the Parish and involved in the pastoral activities of the Parish. Sr Esther Dowling, the last remaining Sister is soon to relocate to Brisbane, and this will bring to an end an unbroken link between the Parish and the Sisters of Mercy.

As an expression of appreciation to the Sisters of Mercy for their 141 years in St Joseph's Parish, Stanthorpe, the 8:30am Mass on Sunday 17th April will be offered in thanksgiving, to be followed by a Parish Morning Tea in the Hospitality Centre which appropriately is on the lower floor of the former Convent.

It is hoped that a number of Sisters of Mercy will be able to attend, especially Sisters who taught at St

Joseph's and lived in the Parish in years gone by. Past students and past parishioners and former teachers are also warmly welcome to join the Parish Community to express thanks to the Sisters of Mercy for their many years of dedicated service.

STUDENTS HEAD OUT WEST!

The students from St Mary's Laidley are familiar with rural life, but in November last year they investigated the impact of the drought on their fellow primary producers in Western Queensland. The Laidley community were so grateful that many communities helped them through the 2011 and 2013 floods that they wanted to give back. In 2014 the students at St Mary's created a program called Rural Connect, which raised \$50,000 for drought affected farmers. The 2015 Year 6 students decided to continue that project by raising funds and collecting house-hold items, to deliver to drought affected graziers in Roma, Charleville and Quilpie. The children were given support from many Brisbane Catholic Education schools to undertake this project.

Year 6 teacher Matthew Hogan said one of the important things was spending money in the drought affected towns. The children spoke at the local Lockyer Rotary Club meeting who were so impressed with what the children were undertaking that they come on board to support the project. Along the journey the Lockyer Valley, Roma, Charleville and Chinchilla Rotary Clubs prepared meals for the children and their teachers.

On Monday morning 16th November, thirty-nine Year 6 children, two teachers, a school officer and Pastoral Worker boarded the bus with Nathan Haley, the Principal following

behind in his Ute. After two hourly stops and noting big kangaroos along the way, one of which hit the bus, the excited and tired passengers arrived for their first night at St Finbarr's Quilpie. We were met by the Principal, Genevieve McNair who showed them to their classrooms where we prepared for our two night stay. They saw first-hand the effects of drought on a rural property. On the second night St Mary's put on a BBQ for the school community and donated items towards a raffle for the local parish.

In Charleville, the children attended a class at the School of Distance Education and handed over \$1000 worth of food and fuel vouchers to give to families in need. Also in Charleville money was given to the neighbourhood centre as well as the parish priest Fr Peter Doohan to assist his needy families. Our children were greeted by the Year 6 children of St Mary's Charleville and our accommodation was in their school hall. At the Flying Doctor base toiletries were dropped off for the families that they visit. In Roma the children stayed in the St John's Sports hall and during the afternoon St John's students organized rotation games mixing the two schools together.

The Laidley children arrived back to their welcoming were hopefully this experience has shown the children the value of giving to those in need on the land. The project's motto was "Every time you open the fridge, thank a farmer".

vocations in local parishes. "Also, we will encourage the family because the family is the seed of vocation" he said.

Parishioner Nessie Ryan expressed the mixed feelings of the parish on hearing the news of Mr Webb's departure. "He's a lovely lad and we're sorry to see him go, although we're pleased he's going to be a priest," Mrs Ryan said.

On completion of the sevenyear formation process Mr Webb would be the first priest to come from Sacred Heart parish. ##




